

# Development and Performance Evaluation of a Manually Operated Reel Cutter

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## ABSTRACT

Considering the various limitations of electrically powered and internal combusting engine powered reel cutter, such as noise and oil population, and cost of maintenance, manually operated reel cutter which has the potential of eliminating these limitations was developed. The manually operated reel cutter was designed based on design theories on the revolution per minute of the wheel, revolution per minute of the smaller gear, the minimum radius of the blade, the power required to drive the machine, power on the cutter cylinder, axial stress on the handle and minimum diameter of the shaft. The designed mechanical reel cutter was constructed with parts such as the roller, the handle, the side members, shaft, brush bar, blade, and blade reel, afterwards, the parts were assembled to form the mechanical reel cutter. Performance evaluation of the constructed reel cutter showed that the average height of the grasses before mowing was 17.573 cm and the average height of the grasses after mowing was 7.325 cm, denoting a grass height ratio of 2.399. The result of the performance evaluation also gave the cutting efficiency of the developed reel cutter as 88% and the cutting rate of the developed reel cutter as  $58.33 \text{ m}^2/\text{hr}$ .

#### INTRODUCTION

The tasteful estimation of the environment of a man is as significant as food and sanctuary. Different people have different responses to the environment in which they live or that which surrounds them. For some, they appreciate a very neat and orderly environment. while for others, a much lower degree of neatness and orderliness would be acceptable (Dutta et al., 2016). Generally, grasses can grow in various conditions, hence the need to diminish their growth to improve the magnificence of the living space condition of man. They tend to grow on their own without being planted intentionally and would grow as long as you leave them or till when the environmental conditions are no longer suitable for their survival. Some grasses are stubborn (hard to get rid of) while others could be relatively easy to eliminate. This varying nature and possibilities that come with grasses have made it a major concern especially in residential areas and the external environment generally (Sujendran and Vanitha, 2014).

When grasses are well maintained, they have the potential of beautifying the environment, while on the other hand, they also

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have the potential of making it look rowdy and scattered. Taking good care of the grasses in the environment is what makes the difference (Dutta et al., 2016). As man advanced mentally and technologically, grass cutting developed into craftsmanship away from the use of hoes, cutlass and machetes, as was the norm in the early human civilizations. Technology and innovations have brought about efficient and better methods of grass cutting and there is still hope for better methods in the future. It was this technological and innovative era that propelled the invention of a reel cutter (Okafor, 2013).

A reel cutter is a machine utilized for cutting grass or lawn (any area of tough grass which is usually cut like a private garden or open park) (Okafor, 2013). A reel cutter is a tool that by methods of at least one rotating sharp edge cuts grass or different plants to an even length. Reel cutters that utilize edges that turn about a vertical pivot are known as rotational trimmers, while those utilizing an edge gathering that turns about a level pivot are known as chamber or reel trimmers. A wide range of reel cutters exists and have been made to fit a specific purpose (Okokpujie et al., 2017). The choice of the design of reel cutter and user preference

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depends on several factors. Such factors could be the cost of purchase of the mower, the cost of maintenance, the ease of use, the efficiency, and sometimes the kind of work to be done with it. Every user has preferences and these preferences are what sponsor their decision on which kind of mower to use (Brenda, 2019).

The cost the traditional method of employing humans to cut grass covering a given area is usually more than the cost of using a reel cutter (Sivagurunathan et al., 2017; Oyedeji et al., 2021). Sometimes the land area to be worked on could be massive, sometimes in multiple hectares and to be able to cut such large areas, several labourers would be required thereby increasing the amount of money required to get the job done. Furthermore, based on environmental limitations associated with grass cutting machines (noise, oil pollution, etc.), the reel cutter has gotten an extraordinary enthusiasm among buyers. Hence, reel cutters have turned out to be extremely basic to our day by day living in keeping up the yards.

From the review of literature, Okafor (2013) designed a simple self-powered reel cutter that uses electricity as its source. The core component of this machine was a batterycontrolled dc electric motor. However, due to the presence of many parts such as the belt pulleys, rechargeable battery, alternator, etc. the end weight of the machine was relatively high. Also, Sujendran and Vanitha (2014) designed and fabricated a smart reel cutter for grass trimming in which the device comprises three straight sharp blade edges which were operated with the assistance of the motor, an alternator and the power supply. However, this device is limited by the presence of a power supply and solar radiation. Also, the size of the lawn that can be covered is limited and a grass collector was not provided in this device.

Furthermore, Ibe (2017) designed a hand-held grass cutting machine which was petrol-powered with rotational sharp blade edges for cutting grass in the yard. However, it was also observed that the machine exposed the operator to lots of vibrations and similarly, the operator being closed to the exhaust of the engine, tended to inhale poisonous gases. Okokpujie et al. (2017) also designed, constructed and checked the performance level of a cylindrical reel cutter via an electric engine. Although the noise level of this machine was

relatively lower, the capability of the machine to cover a wider grass area is lower. Also, a grass collector was not incorporated in this design. Also, Adeodu et al. (2018) developed an embedded obstacle avoidance and path planning autonomous solar grass cutting robot tasked for an outdoor environment. However, this machine is similarly dependent on solar radiation and in cases of low radiation or Polar Regions, this machine's performance is low. Shanmugasundar et al. (2018) designed and fabricated an eco-friendly pedal-operated reel cutter for agricultural applications which works on the principle of gears and pedal of a cycle. However, the cutting speed of this mower is dependent on the cycling speed which is in turn dependent on the ability of the user. Also, there is a tendency that the cutting process cannot be used for long, hence its usage is limited to the small-sized area.

As seen from the literature review. although many works have been done on reel cutters, it was observed that there have been limited studies that attempt to harness the conversion of the mechanical energy of the wheel of the reel cutter into rotational energy for the cutting blade edges. This will help reduce the dependency on solar energy, chemical energy or electrical energy. This will also increase the grass area that can be covered and its usage will not be limited by solar radiation. Also, the overall cost of the machine will be reduced due to little maintenance making it more affordable. Hence, this study developed and carried out a performance evaluation of a manual reel cutter.

## MATERIALS AND METHODS Description of the Reel Cutter

The working principle of the reel cutter is such that an individual pushes on the handlebars which is the source of power application and this propels the wheel of the trimmer forward. As the hub turns, gears start to spin. The configuration of the gear system is that the first gear which is connected to the wheel is of bigger diameter than the small gear which is connected to the rotating blade. Based on the principle of the gear train, the power and torque of the bigger gear are transferred to the smaller gear which results in much higher torque.

The brush bar or rod located at the front of the trimmer helps in bending the tall

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grasses and folding them over into the turning sharp blades. Cutting occurs when the turning edges meet the stationary cutter bar located at the back of the trimmer. This meeting point of the blades can be likened to the cutting edges

of a pair of scissors. The chamber gathers up the grass and moves it to the cutter bar and these grasses can be gathered after from the lawn. The schematic of the reel mower is shown in Figure 1.

## **Design Considerations**

The following design considerations are taken into account for this design:

- Handgrip was comfortable (padded): 1. Padding the handgrip prevented metal-tohand contact which may cause some irritations and sometimes injuries.
- 2. The reel cutter should be lightweight and easy to carry: Material selections for this design were mindful of weight, especially if you have steps to cross over.
- Large wheels: This enabled easy mowing 3. of the lawn and obstacles can be overcome easily.

### Determination of the Minimum Diameter of the Shaft

#### **Performance Test**

The performance evaluation of the reel cutter is based on three field tests namely:

1. Grass Height Ratio: This is the parameter that compares the height of the grass before cutting with the height of the grass after cutting. The height of the grass before cutting is determined by measuring the Grass Height Patio  $= \frac{H_a}{2}$

The average height of the grasses that made up the test site was measured using a meter rule and afterwards, the developed reel cutter was used to mow the grasses within the grassland. Then the new heights of the grasses after cutting were measured and a comparison of the average height of the grasses before and after mowing was made.

**Cutting Efficiency of the Reel Cutter**: The cutting efficiency of the reel cutter is the parameter that measures the compatibility of the reel cutter with the desired application. It is the measure of the ratio of desired result mowed area with the total mowed area. The desired result mowed area is the area mowed that conforms to the desired height outcome. This is given as (Okafor, 2013):

# **RESULTS AND DISCUSSION**

The comparison of the average height of the grasses before and after mowing is given in

Figure 3. Figure 2 shows the areas on the test sites mowed and yet to be mowed.

From the result obtained, the average height of the grasses before mowing was 17.573 cm and the average height of the grasses after mowing was 7.325 cm, hence,

applying Equation (18), the grass height ratio is obtained as 2.399. Also, the result shows that the final grass height obtained from the

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developed reel mower falls between 5.08 cm and 8.255 cm (Martini et al., 2015).

#### **Cutting Efficiency of the Reel Cutter**

To determine the cutting efficiency of the reel cutter, the sum of the areas of the test site with grass height above 8.255 cm as stated by Martini et al. (2015) was obtained. These

areas formed the uncut regions of the test site, and subtracting the uncut regions from the test site gives the area of the test site with acceptable mowed grass height. Applying Equation (19), the cutting efficiency of the developed reel cutter was obtained as tabulated in Table 1.

From the result obtained in Table 1, the cutting efficiency of the developed reel cutter is 88%. This shows an average cutting efficiency, however, where a high level of grass height consistency is necessary, reel cutters with a high cutting efficiency of 95 percent to 99 percent are best employed. Grasslands utilised for sports like football, as well as grasslands used for aesthetic purposes, both require great cutting efficiency. However, for such purposes, this reel cutter would not deliver the necessary results. In comparison with other studies however such as that of Okafor (2013) who obtained a cutting efficiency of 89.55% for a self-powered electrical reel cutter, the developed reel cutter has a close cutting efficiency.

#### Cutting Rate of the Reel Cutter

In the determination of the capacity of the developed reel cutter, the time taken to mow the test site was measured using a stopwatch. Using Equation (3.20), the capacity of the developed reel cutter was obtained and tabulated in Table 2.
