

Harmonics Analysis in Power Supply Systems: A Case Study

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ABSTRACT

This work presents harmonic analysis which is a multiple of the fundamental frequency in various power supply systems. The subject matter includes the waveforms, frequencies, magnitudes and the phase angles. The influence of harmonics in power system (PS) has some significances such as reliability, lost time validity and the competence of electrical equipment. The research was borne out of gathering of data from various power sources (PS) and PHCN. These include 3.2 kVA, 2.8 kVA, 3.5 kVA, 250 kVA, 40 kVA, PHCN voltage 220 – 230 V, all operating at 50 Hz initial frequency. From the above stated power bases, data were gotten with 'Owon meter/Oscilloscope'; they were analyzed using MatlabR2018a software. A double tuned low-pass passive shunt filter configuration was designed for the simulation of harmonics in sources being considered. The signal was first digitized, then Fast Fourier Transform (FFT) was work out. This was verified through results of the V_{THD} of the supplies that precincts to the IEEE 519 1992 5% standard. The results gotten for the three numbers single-phase generators supply systems before and after simulation are as follows 1.61%, 1.37%, while 3-phase has 1.321%, 1.19% and the PHCN is 0.79% these values are within the limits of IEEE-519-92 of 5% variation level used for the work.

INTRODUCTION

The work is to look into the harmonics due to non-linear loads in selected single-phase generators acting as alternative power supply systems and to mitigate their effects. The objectives are as follows: Measurement of data (frequencies and voltages) from single-phase generators using digitalized scope. Determination of THD for single-phase generators and evaluating performance of waveforms obtained for various voltage disturbances using FFT technique. Validation of data from various power supply system with IEEE 519-1992, 5% standard.

Changes in sinusoidal waveform of voltage/current of either 50/60 Hz can cause equipment to mal-function and will not give credence to the expected PQ to be delivered to end users. Frequency higher than fundamental is called harmonic caused by non-linear loads in PS (Koray et al, 2009). Non-linear loads in PS include the following: computers, frequency drives, variable speed motors, diodes, etc. is a global

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practice that these nonlinear loads are vastly used in our day-to-day operations. Therefore, the grid is common source of distribution of quality of power transmitted to end users must be free from disturbance associated with harmonics and any other disturbances that may arise in the PS.

Parameters like poor PF, voltage instability, low efficiency of electrical equipment, etc. found in PS have adverse consequences in the delivery of good quality power. Besides, good energy delivery should be harnessed especially where supply of power is inadequate for end users (Mansoor et al, 1995). Thus, single-phase generators as the case under consideration are alternative source associated with loads causes heat losses and pulsation of torques with vibrations resulting in iron and copper losses since they both depend on frequency (IEEE Proposed Procedures, ANSI/IEEE Std. 519-1992). From the foregoing, Nigeria being a developing nation needs regular power supply by the end users their

welfare to achieve there is over dependence on small generators in every home.

From Figure 1, power source load and scope are linked to receptacle to accommodate loads: plasma TV, personal computer and ultrasound scanning machine, data and waveforms of portable generator connected in turn. Each generator was loaded in turn and fed to the personal computer with Owon oscilloscope meter, the output waveform and data were captured and recorded.

The various loads connected generate waveforms displayed from the inbuilt components of microprocessor which are non-linear loads. Investigation of the THD was done for each power source and the loads. Figure 2 used in simulation of the THD; the analysis was done before and after filtering data was recorded that confines to the 5% IEEE 519-92 Standard Universidade (UNIVERSIDADE, 2000)

RELATED WORKS

It is expedient to know that exceeding the AVR, THD and the DPF limit will cause voltage/current resonance that will result in oscillation. The resultant effect of mechanical resonance that coincides with frequency can cause splintering of single-phase generator. The method adopted for addressing the harmonic problem was active broad band filters that handle the required loads for the DPF amount/quantity and harmonic currents; this will cut off generator from circuit the reactive and harmonic currents still circulate (Henderson et al, 1994; Eyenubo and Ezekiel, 2022).

Distortion will be very high when nonlinear loads connected to generator than when supply is from public utility. The resultant impedance from the generator is almost three times compared with transformers attached public utility. Blocking filters for third harmonic load resolved the HD to an appreciable level harmonic not totally attenuated will give negative sequence voltage yielding fifth harmonic current thereby giving rise to generator failure earlier than expected (Ian C. Evans, IEEE Paper; Eyenubo and Oshevire, (2017).

Resonance effect caused the capacitance of a transmitter system is powered by a generator can cause harmonic problems. Though, resonance frequency varies due to circulating current; more so, when the generator frequency becomes higher due to circulating. Band pass active filter can attenuate harmonic current to become in-active; which can also regulate the impedance thereby suppressing resonance but some instability of the circulating current. (Gregory and Williams).

RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

The study presents an investigation and harmonic mitigation in PS, it involves the following:

- 1. Carrying out literature review of harmonic in PS through recording of frequency and voltage using Owon meter Oscilloscope instrument from the following single-phase generating system systems. Data analysis using reliable assessment tools Matlab R2018a software. Validation of data from various power supply systems with IEEE 519-1992, 5% standard.
- 2. Analysis and guidelines are necessary tools in determining the problems created by harmonics
- 3. Study of Useful Guidelines and Standards available in agreement with IEEE- 519 is the main standard in US places limit on voltage/current distortion THD) IEC- 555 for Europe and some areas of South America places limit on voltage distortion IEC- 61000- 3- 12 proposed draft places limits on voltage distortion for input current > 16A and < 75A.

Data Collection

Three power sources of single-phase generators were used for data capturing. The Owon meter/Oscilloscope linked to the computer to record the frequencies at each interval. Data collected from the power sources selected for this study for the following ways using the following loads - deep freezer, fridge, water pump, ultrasound scanning machine, plasma TV and the personal computer.

Filter Detuning: (IEC 61000-4-34, Ed 1 2013; Eyenubo, Ubeku E. U and Offor, 2014): Filter arms are sharply tuned to dominant harmonic frequencies, i.e. $11th$, $13th$, $15th$ and higher order harmonics and a damped arm filter for higher harmonics. At resonance filter impedance is purely resistive given by

When harmonic current divide between the PS and filter parameters there is an inverse ratio of their impedances, so for increased impedance the filter efficiency will be lowered; thus, the frequency response of resonant filter arm with a typical detuning range δ . Besides lowering the filtering efficiency will the a-c network impedance may produce undesirable resonance phenomena

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The combination of passive element forms the double this reduces the power loss at fundamental frequency. The filter components made of four parallel circuits.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

1. Table 1: shows power resource 1, 3.2 kVA at a frequency (F 46.517 Hz), loaded with non-linear loads this results in the output waveform illustrated in Figure 4; while Table 2 is presenting the voltage waveform and harmonic spectrum showed in Figure 5 after simulation. Figure 6 displays the voltage harmonic spectrum 1st - 5th harmonics after simulation. During loading condition, the was 0.0709 = 7.09% then after simulation it was noted to be $0.0161 = 1.61\% \text{ V}$ _{THD}

2. Table 4: illustrate power supply 2, 2.8 kVA at a frequency (F 48.997 Hz), loaded with non-linear loads this results in the output waveform established in Figure 7; while Table 5 is illustrating the voltage waveform and harmonic form displayed in Figure 8 after simulation. Figure 9 exhibits the voltage waveform and harmonic spectrum 1st - 5th after simulation. During loading condition, the V_{THD} was 0.0524 = 5.24% then after simulation it was noted to be 0.0151 = 1.51%.

3. Table 7 depicts power basis 3, 4 kVA at a frequency (F 43.804 Hz), loaded with non-linear loads this results in the output presented in Figure 10; while Table 8 is showing the voltage waveform and harmonic range confirmed in Figure 11 after simulation. Figure 12 shows the voltage graph and harmonic spectrum 1st – 9th after simulation. During loading condition, the V_{THD} was 0.0137% = 1.37% then after simulation it was noted become $0.0137\% = 1.37\%$.

4. Table 10 depicts power basis 4, 40 kVA at a frequency (F 50.024 Hz), is a 3- ϕ have its operating frequency loaded with non-linear loads this results in the output waveform presented in Figure 10; while Table 11 is showing the voltage shape and harmonic band confirmed in Figure 13 after simulation. Figure 14 shows the voltage function and harmonic range 1st and 3rd after simulation. During loading condition, the V_{THD} was $0.01321 = 1.321\%$, less than the expected IEEE standard of 5% after simulation.

5. Table 13 power source 5, 250 kVA at a frequency (F 51.174 Hz), is a 3- ϕ have its operating frequency loaded with non-linear loads this results in the output waveform presented in Figure 10; while Table 14 is showing the voltage shape and harmonic band confirmed in Figure 16 after simulation. Figure 18 shows the voltage function and harmonic range 1st and 3rd after simulation. During loading condition, the V_{THD} was $0.0119\% = 1.19\%$, less than the expected IEEE standard of 5% after simulation.

6. Table 16 is utility, PHCN at a frequency (F 50.568 Hz), is a 3- ϕ have its operating frequency loaded with non-linear loads this results in the output waveform presented in Figure 19; while Table 17 is showing the voltage shape and harmonic band confirmed in Figure 20 after simulation. Figure 21 shows the voltage function and harmonic range 1st and 3rd after simulation. During loading condition, the V_{THD} was 0.0079 = 0.79%, less than the expected IEEE standard of 5% after simulation.

It can be observed that the frequencies 46.517 Hz, 48.997 HZ and 43.804 Hz single-phasegenerators their frequencies measured during the procedure are less than the working frequency of 50 Hz as contained on their nameplates, while the

3- ϕ power sources and PHCN are 50.024 Hz, 51.174 Hz and 50.568 Hz generator with its normal rated frequency.

CONCLUSION

The work reviews power quality drawbacks that trigger power structure interruption in electrical set-up. The viable means of power supply handled in review of harmonics workings data, waveforms and the phase angles are examined. The controlling benchmarks of IEEE 519-92 for establishing the voltage total harmonic distortion (V_{THD}) for the different power sources used, their function performances are also depicted in the work. The patterning simulations methods of harmonics utilizing a low-pass passive shunt filter for the various power bases were investigated using Matlab. The results gotten are verified and found suitable when evaluated with the IEEE 519-92.

Drawbacks with non-linear loads causes increase with modern office buildings having facilities that comprised of microprocessorbased apparatus. New challenge for design engineers since there is usage of electronic paraphernalia that make up major appliances used in buildings. The non-linear loads comprise the following lighting, personal computers or speed control units for motors etc. Identification of the causes and extenuation of harmonics can assist in preventing harmonic interrelated challenges at the design period decrease the likelihood of undesired outcomes occurring.

Electronic filtering was used for the diminution harmonics; in some instances, capacitors can be installed in the filter bank for harmonic filtering know-hows. Special significance must be offered to the presentation of filters used in harmonic improvement.

CONTRIBUTION TO KNOWLEDGE

An algorithm for calculating the magnitude and the Phase angle of the waveform was achieved using the MatlabR2018a software. The contributions from this work are as follows: (1). Data base for harmonic content of commonly portable generator used in Nigeria for analysis was established, (2). The performance characteristic index V_{THD} for the investigated portable generator that will inform customers" decisions on the purchase and use of these systems in Nigerian have been obtained. (3). An electronic filter to reduce harmonic content in commonly used portable generator in Nigeria

have been designed was achieved using the Matlab software.

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
