



Development and Performance Analysis of a Multi-point Radio Frequency Identification File Tracking System

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ABSTRACT

This research discussed the concept of Developing and Carrying out Performance Analysis of a Multi-Point RFID based file tracking system. Locating files is one of the greatest problems in organization nowadays and large volume of data are usually generated in most institutions of learning/ organizations. Time is wasted in searching files, energy is misused, in looking for misplaced files, deadlines are missed and sometimes files are lost. The study used Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) technology as a method of tracking and managing movement of files from one location to another within an organization. Algorithms for tracking of files were developed. This algorithms involve searching the whole database for a file to be tracked and checking for the last time the file was entered into or the time a file moves from one office to another with a view of locating the file. The RFID tracking system can track the location of files within three (3) offices and near field communication (NFC) tags are placed in the file of staff which has a unique identification number. The universal serial Bus (USB) reader will send response to each tag within the reading range of the USB reader. The control units are responsible for receiving the information from the RFID unit and tracking the tagged staff where necessary. The system consists of terminal unit which include xbee s2c module, Reader, Tag, Personnel computer (pc). At end of this research, it was established that all the aim and objectives were achieved. A 3-point RFID Based File Tracking System was successfully implemented, performance of the system based on number of files to be tracked was simultaneously done in which, the design of the system can track up to 256 files at a time.. However, thirty (30) files were simulated and eight (8) were implemented. Thus, increase in number of files is directly proportional to increase in time. Comparison between this research and other previous works was carried out. Part of the caveat of this work is the fact that every staff should carry RFID card and swipe at the door post when going in or closing from office. The file any staff carries will communicate with an RFID reader installed on the door post. The limitation of this work could serve as a good recommendation for future research.

INTRODUCTION

File Tracking System (FTS) is a system that manages all the files movement when required, that is from one desk to another or from one office to another within a given organization or institutions and help in managing the movement of file efficiently and

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knowing the location of all files. Any desk can receive and send request decision at any time. The system follows a procedure of unique numbering and enables file management, file status monitoring, file tracking, etc. It is also a very powerful search system that locates files

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and analyzes their history of movement of that file (Krasnaqi 2016).

Similarly, most of today's data processing is done using manual approaches. Letters are hand-written or are typed manually in most businesses because they are small. For example, an operator of stationeries who buys and supplies equipment to three or four vendors believes that there is no need for accounting system and thereby care less about keeping vital information. It is a system that does not involve the use of machine, almost all the work is done manually (Fagbolu, 2018). When it comes to an effective and smooth running of office, there are certain elements that must be implemented, in any industry one find himself. Firstly, files are the key to your operation and learning how to properly maintain a sufficient paper trail can make a world of difference when it comes to your daily operations (Anne, 2012). One peculiar characteristics of the information age is that companies and organizations have completely depended upon their computermaintained files for information storage, organization and retrieval. Existing manual system are often replaced with electronic filing system as a result of social changes that have created large, complex political and economic structure (Fagbolu, 2018).

According to Rouse (2017), RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) is a form of wireless communication that incorporates the use electromagnetic or electrostatic coupling in the radio frequency portion of the electromagnetic spectrum to uniquely identify an object, animal or person. This technology comprises of three major components: Scanning antenna, Transceiver (often combined into one reader, also known as an interrogator) and Transponder (the RFID tag). An RFID tag consists of a microchip, memory and antenna. RFID reader is a network-connected device that can be permanently attached or portable. It uses radio frequency waves to transmit signals that activate tag. Once activated, the tag sends a wave back to the antenna, where it is translated into data.

The data that is transmitted is then interpreted, tracked from the rest of the file and immediate action required is taken by the management. The RFID system consists of tags with antenna, Reader with antenna, middleware and backend or stored database. The tag includes a chip which stores a special series identifier that is utilized to identify the things individually. The tag can be indicating the object from multi meters distance and in front of the RFID reader. RFID tags have three kinds which are active, passive and semi-passive tag. The active tag is that which does not require eternal source, it has battery source built in it, the passive tag is that which is initiated by the reader, it does not have battery source built in it, and the semi passive tags have the properties of both of them (Abdulsada, 2017).

The research analyses the Development and performance of a Multi-Point Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) based file tracking system, however the research area covered three (3) offices, which are as follows; Training & Operation, Administrative duties and Logistics operation. Therefore, the research objectives have been achieved during the Development and Performance Analysis of a Multi-Point RFID Based File Tracking System (Faisal *et al.*, 2019).

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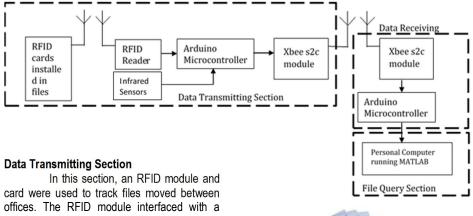

Methods

The design is accomplished by breaking each logical step down into the block diagram of figure 1. In this design, it is intended

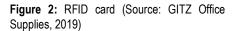
to track the location of files between three offices, the design is composed of a data transmitting section, a data receiving section and file query section.



In this section, an RFID module and card were used to track files moved between offices. The RFID module interfaced with a microcontroller, reading card IDs wirelessly. It matched IDs to the files and staff. Infrared sensors aided in distinguishing files entering and leaving offices, with data sent wirelessly via Xbee to the Data receiving station.

RFID Cards or Tags

Radio Identification Frequency (RFID) is technology that employs а electromagnetic fields for automatic identification and tracking of tags affixed to objects (Deviselvam, 2019). These tags, often referred to as RFID cards, store electronic information. This design utilizes passive tags that draw power from the RFID reader. Figure.2 displays an RFID card, which can be affixed to various items such as cash, files, clothing, and more.



RFID Reader and Interfacing with Controller

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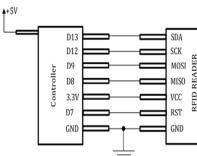


Figure 4: Interfacing RFID reader with

The RFID reader, an electronic device, is utilized for gathering information from RFID tags to track objects (Anne, 2012). Diverse RFID readers possess varying sensing ranges for RFID tags. These readers generate a high-frequency electromagnetic field, inducing voltage in the tag's antenna coil through electromagnetic induction as the tag approaches. This induced voltage serves as the tag's power source, enabling it to respond to the reader. Figure 3 showcases the RC522 RFID card reader, while Figure 4 illustrates the circuit diagram for interfacing the card with a controller, employing the Serial Peripheral Interface (SPI) communication protocol.

Infrared Sensors and Interfacing with controller

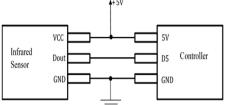


Figure 6: Interfacing infrared sensor with Arduino nano controller

In this setup, six infrared sensors are deployed to detect and distinguish movement direction, with two sensors per office. When movement occurs near a sensor, the connected digital pin (Dout) signals logic one to the controller. The controller's programming discerns which sensor is triggered first, determining whether the movement is "into" or "out of" the office for transmission to the data receiving section. Figure 5 illustrates the infrared sensor, and Figure 6 depicts the circuit diagram for its interface with the controller.

Xbee S2C Radios and Interfacing with Controller

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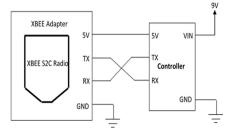


Figure 8: Interfacing XBEE module

In this design, XBee S2C radios are used for wireless communication, operating on ZigBee mesh communication protocols (IEEE 802.15.4 PHY). These modules enable wireless connectivity within ZigBee mesh networks, including devices from different manufacturers. XBee modules, developed by 'DiGi,' follow the ZigBee protocol for wireless communication. XBee radios were chosen over Bluetooth due to their superior wireless range and the ability to configure multiple XBee radios to send data wirelessly to a single receiver. Figure 7 displays an XBee S2C radio with its adapter (XBee Explorer) for easy computer connection and configuration. Additionally, Figure 8 presents a circuit diagram illustrating how the XBee radio interfaces with a microcontroller, specifically an Arduino Nano.

Arduino Nano Microcontroller

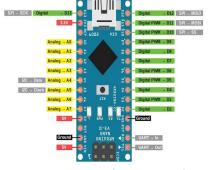


Figure 9: Pinout of Arduino nano (Matt

In this project, the chosen microcontroller is the Arduino Nano, selected for its versatility. This microcontroller houses an ATmega328P chip on a compact board, providing both 5V and 3.3V DC power supplies, a USB interface for programming, and a Vin pin for a wide range of DC power inputs (6V-20V). It was preferred for its 3.3V power supply compatibility, essential for interfacing with the RFID module. The Arduino Nano handles all processing and computing tasks. Figure 9 depicts the pinout and a picture of the Arduino Nano microcontroller.

Data Receiving Section (Receiver)

This part of the design comprises of an arduino interfaced to an xbee radio (see section 4.4.4). The arduino is programmed to receive data coming from the transmitting section. This section receives its' power from

Power Supply

The power supply employed in this work is essentially a 9v Alkaline battery only connected to the Vin pin of the arduinonano controller. The arduinonano has an on board 5V and 3.3V regulator thereby eliminating the need to build any power supply. All components used in this design run on either 5V or 3.3V dc power supply.

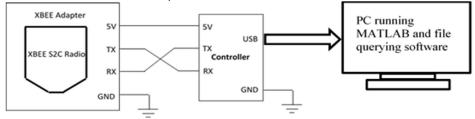


Figure 10: Receiver interfaced to PC

File Querying Section

This part of this design comprises of a personal computer and MATLAB program that stores all information regarding files and movement of files in its data base. A database program is written and a Graphics User Interface is also written. The GUI has user interface controls used to not only connect to serial port of a computer but also to query the

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done by inputting the card ID into a virtual serial terminal. When this happens the user then enter the office name, followed by the file name, followed by the direction of movement of the file (in or out) and the program records everything on another serial terminal and sends all this information to MATLAB. Time tracking is simulated using a DS1307 virtual RTC.

RESULT AND DISCUSSION

Simulation Results: Results obtained from the simulation are presented in Table 2. Simulation was done using the codes presented in Appendix IV.

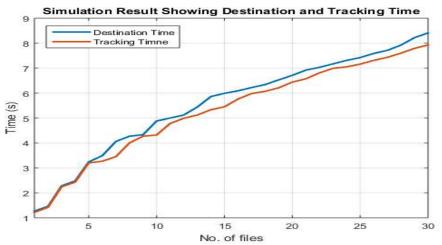


Figure 12: Graph of Tracking / Destination time versus number of files

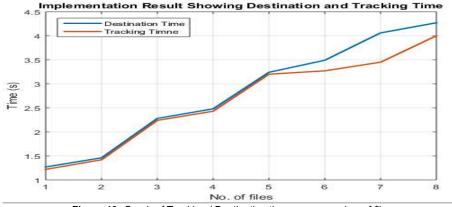


Figure 13: Graph of Tracking / Destination time versus number of files

#### DISCUSSIONS

During simulation, movement of thirty files was simulated using proteus 8.0 professional simulating software and the results obtained were tabulated and graphed in Table 4.1 and Figure 4.1 respectively. From these results, the employee moving the files, the name of the file being moved, the direction of the file and the destination of the files were all recorded by the system. The time and date of the movement were also recorded. All this data collection forms the database of the system.

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As data is being collected, it is sent wirelessly and in real-time to a remote computer where it is stored. These stored data become the database of the system. In the simulation stage, proteus was used to simulate the circuit diagram/movement of files of the system while MATLAB was used to simulate or implement the database section of the system. Proteus was interfaced or linked to MATLAB so as the data is being collected in proteus, it is immediately sent to MATLAB for the creation of the database.

After the database has been created, the GUI is then used to query information from the database. Querying this information is done by entering the name of the file to be tracked in the search box of the database GUI and hitting the search button.Also, tracking time and destination time were gathered from the simulation stage using a built-in MATLAB function viz "tic toc" and the results are tabulated in Table 3

At the implementation stage, actual RFID cards were used against the virtual RFID card used during the simulation. Also actual movement of files was carried out and infra-red sensors were used to sense the direction of movement of these files including the employee wielding the file. At this stage, eight files were implemented and the results obtained and tabulated in Table 4.

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From these results, the employee moving the files, the name of the file being moved, the direction of the file and the destination of the files were all recorded by the system. The time and date of movement were also recorded. All this data collection forms the database of the system. After the database has been created, the GUI is then used to query information from the database. Querying this information is done by entering the name of the file to be tracked in the search box of the database GUI and hitting the search button.

#### Simulation and Implementation Results

Accurate tracking of files both at the simulation stage and implementation stage was achieved and produced the same results as can be seen in Appendix III. However, tracking time and destination time produced only slightly different results. These results are tabulated in Table 4.3 while the graphs showing this difference are shown in Figures 3 and 4. Figure 3 is a graph showing destination time comparism between simulation and implementation while figure 4 is a graph showing tracking time comparism between simulation and implementation.

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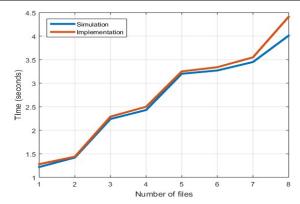


Figure 15: Tracking time graph (simulation vs implementation)

## CONCLUSION

In conclusion, the research is a success as the aim and objectives were achieved. A three-point RFID based file tracking system was successfully implemented. Performance of the system, especially based on number of files tracked simultaneously was done in the sense that the system can track up to 256 files, increase in number of files is directly proportional to increase in memory because during the desgn Arduino nano was used and arduino nano has a Random Access Memory(RAM)which has a memory of two kilobytes. However, in this research work thirty (30) files was simulated and eight (8) number of files was implemented. The results have revealed that increase in number of files is directly proportional to the time taken and also the memory size, which implies that the threshold (Multipoint RFID Based File Tracking System) would be able to track number of files simultaneously as the number files increase its affect the tracking time. Finally, the work was compared with other existing works in terms of speed and system performance (i.e tracking more than one file at a time)

## RECOMMENDATIONS

Part of the caveats of this work is the fact that no database software was utilized for querying of files. Therefore, it is recommended that:

1. Database software for querying files should be developed in order to make the simulation very easy.

- More research should be done to improve the memory size of the system so that can track more files
- This work is also recommended to be used in schools, especially higher institutions, to keep attendance of students. Also, this work can be utilized in industries and super market.

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
